**INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

Chairman Zimmerman led the invocation followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

**COMMUNICATION FROM MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC AND COUNTY EMPLOYEES**

Zoey Carter, a Pekin resident, voiced concern about the proposed CO2 pipeline in Tazewell County.

Robin Miller, a Green Valley resident, spoke on Wolf Carbon Solutions process of obtaining land for their projects.

Michael Legler, a Tazewell County resident, voiced concern about the proposed CO2 pipeline. He spoke on how the pipeline would affect future generations.

Chuck Maas, a concerned citizen, spoke about developing the CO2 pipeline in a flood plain. He encouraged the Tazewell County Board to oppose this project.

Karl Lutz, a business owner, voiced concern with the proposed pipeline and the use of tax dollars going to Canada. He encouraged the Tazewell County Board to seek legal remedies to prevent this project.

## TAZEWELL COUNTY BOARD MINUTES OCTOBER 25, 2023

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Elton Rocke, Citizen to Stop Pipeline Representative, voiced concern about the pipeline and stated he has had conversations with some of the board members. He suggested the board get involved in opposing the project. He presented petitions to Chairman Zimmerman, signed by citizens against the CO2 pipeline in Tazewell County.

Timothy Larkin, a Delevan resident, voiced his opposition to the pipeline and encouraged others to speak up against the proposal.

Kim Bowers, a concerned citizen, presented a Resolution passed by the Cincinnati Township Board to County Administrator Deluhery. She spoke on tax credits that are offered by the government for carbon capturing.

Kathy Gilbert, a Tremont resident, voiced her concern with the proposed CO2 pipeline.

Dr. Matt Gordon, Superintendent Rankin School District # 98, spoke on his opposition to the CO2 pipeline. He encouraged local governments to oppose this project.

**JOINT RESOLUTION APPROVING A MORATORIUM ON ANY CONSIDERATIONS,  
AGREEMENTS, OR REQUESTS RELATED TO HIGH PRESSURE LIQUIFIED  
CARBON DIOXIDE PIPELINES**

WHEREAS, high-pressure carbon dioxide (also known as CO<sup>2</sup>) pipelines have been, and are currently proposed to be, constructed in Central Illinois; and

WHEREAS, no high-pressure carbon dioxide pipelines currently exist in Cincinnati Township; and

WHEREAS, after consulting with professionals, Cincinnati Township officials have learned a significant amount of information regarding carbon dioxide gas and these pipelines;

WHEREAS, officials have learned that carbon dioxide gas, in high concentrations, can asphyxiate, or at lower concentrations, can sicken humans and livestock, thereby creating a risk of injury or even death; and

WHEREAS, a rupture of a carbon dioxide pipeline has the potential to release a large quantity of carbon dioxide gas at high concentration levels that could travel potentially a mile from any such rupture, depending on the weather and other factors; and

WHEREAS, carbon dioxide gas is colorless and odorless, and may not be detected by humans, making exposure difficult to detect and avoid and danger zones difficult to define; and

WHEREAS, carbon dioxide gas can intoxicate citizens and first responders and cause disorientation and confusion, limiting the potential for self-evacuation by citizens and making first responder rescue operations challenging and dangerous; and

WHEREAS, carbon dioxide gas is heavier than air and can settle in low-lying areas and closed structures for significant periods of time; and

WHEREAS, high concentrations of carbon dioxide gas following a rupture of a carbon dioxide pipeline could cause internal combustion engines in motor vehicles to malfunction or even stop operating, limiting the ability of citizens to use their vehicles to self-evacuate, and limiting the ability of first responders to use rescue vehicles; and

WHEREAS, the Cincinnati Township Board of Trustees (the "Board") and the Cincinnati Township Road District Highway Commissioner (the "Highway Commissioner") will likely have no reliable information about the geographic extent of the potential danger zone following a rupture of any currently proposed carbon dioxide pipeline or any proposed in the future; and

WHEREAS, large, high-pressure liquified carbon dioxide pipelines may rupture with substantial force as the carbon dioxide depressurizes into a gas, producing running ductile fracturing for extensive

distances unless stopped through use of sufficiently strong pipe steel or crack arrestors, putting nearby citizens and properties in danger; and


WHEREAS, the Township, Road District, and area first responders should not bear the cost of the specialized emergency response equipment, training, and other resources uniquely necessary for response to a high-pressure liquified carbon dioxide pipeline rupture.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cincinnati Township Board of Trustees and the Cincinnati Township Road District Highway Commissioner both approve a moratorium on any considerations, agreements, or requests related to high-pressure liquified carbon dioxide pipelines in any way and asks all other governments in Central Illinois to honor this moratorium and pass their own moratoria. Further, the Cincinnati Township Road District will table any request regarding use of and/or access to its highways (as defined under 605 ILCS 5/2-202), related to the construction of any high-pressure liquified carbon dioxide pipelines, until updated federal and/or state regulations are issued in full effect, including those by the United States Pipeline Hazardous Materials Safety Administration regarding high-pressure carbon dioxide pipelines.

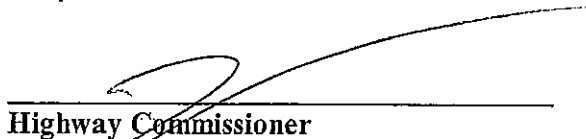

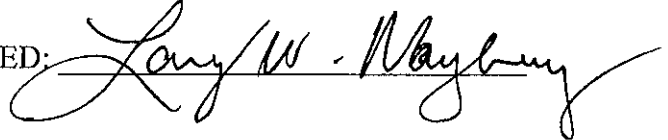

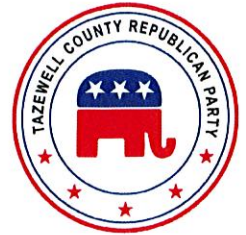

## ARPA Survey Results Summary

October, 2023

The Tazewell County Republican Party conducted a survey by request of concerned citizens of the county. The survey was conducted on the party website and was open for respondents from Saturday, October 14, 2023 through October 21, 2023.

The focus of the survey was to poll respondents on their thoughts on how the \$26.5 million of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding designated to Tazewell County, Illinois, should be allocated. A brief introduction to the survey and an explanation of the purpose of ARPA funding was given and then the respondent was given the following question with four proposals, three of which are currently being considered by the Tazewell County Board and one which will be presented for the board's consideration;

Presented in the optional responses are brief descriptions of the three proposals and one additional proposal for your consideration. Which proposal would you support from the four listed below?

- A) Proposal 1- Construction of a new building to house three (3) Courtrooms and Court Functions - Approx. Size: 60,000 sq. ft. - Estimated Cost: \$21 - \$24 Million.
- B) Proposal 2 - Construction of a new building to house six (6) courtrooms and court functions - Approx. Size: 77,000 sq. ft. - Estimated Cost: \$28 - \$32 million.
- C) Proposal 3 - Construction of a new building to house six (6) Courtrooms, Court Functions and Tax Cycle Functions (County Treasurer, Auditor, County Clerk, Recorder) - Approx. Size: 82,000 sq. ft. - Estimated Cost: \$34 - \$39 million.
- D) Proposal 4 - First, repair existing county buildings and adjust employee wages and benefits to reflect the current competitive environment. Second, review building construction needs considering remaining funds - Est. Cost: \$22 million.

Pages 3-5 of this report reflect a summary of the survey.

Notes:

1. Of the 108 respondents, two were culled as they were outside of Tazewell County.
2. Not all demographic information was available in the Tazewell County Republican NationBuilder database.

3. Some respondents sent an email to the Tazewell County Republican Chairman to make comments. Those comments are shared without edit below.

**Comment 1.** None of the 4 listed. That option wasn't on the list, so I'll publicly post here. Definitely NOT the 4<sup>th</sup> option as government is already large and accounts for more spending than it was intended to, so increasing salaries for public service positions and their assistants/divisions would only increase spending and worsen the situation. If the option for "none of the above" is added to the survey, I will delete this comment and let my voice speak there. Thank you for bringing this up for public opinion. It's fantastic that you are seeking a voice from constituents – something long forgotten by governing bodies.

**Comment 2.** I don't agree with any of these building proposals. I tried to put in my own thoughts and it would not take it. I feel we should take this money and bolster the city police and the county law enforcement due to all of the crime concerns, illegal immigrants, and recently the inmates let out of our county jail. Also fix the roads, they're terrible.

**Comment 3.** I completed the survey because it forced me to choose one of the alternatives however, it should have provided several other options or at least a feedback box. I voted for option 4 since you could not submit unless you chose an option. If there was one for "None of the above" I would have voted for that. I was generally ok with option 4 except the wording about "adjust employee wages and benefits to reflect the current competitive environment" I don't believe we should use a windfall of tax money (or worse yet borrowed money) to pay employees wages and benefits. If we don't have the funds to pay them properly, how are we going to continue to pay them the new wages and benefits when the windfall is used up? If we are not currently paying these employees a competitive wage and benefits then the County board needs to address that issue from its current revenue stream. My wife and I are retired and live on fixed income now, as you would expect. We have to make difficult decisions all the time on how to budget our money and not deficit spend.

**Comment 4.** Doesn't our budget allocate for repairs and increased wages already? If not, that's poor planning.

**Comment 5.** It sounds like we are planning on abandoning our historic courthouse. Why? What will become of it? An empty lot or a shopping center?

**Comment 6.** I wanted to reach out in regards to the survey emails that were sent. When the first email went out last weekend, I clicked the link to cast my vote immediately. I reviewed the options and was puzzled. I paused and re-read the paragraph again, and it stated, this funding is to be used for Covid-19 pandemic relief within our county. I read the options again and thought, "What on earth does building a new courthouse, regardless of how big or what additional departments are included, none of these options have anything to do with COVID-19 pandemic relief to our county."

I firmly believe that if this survey were written in a manner where "none of the above" or "other" were options for casting your vote, the results would be very different than they are currently.

I ultimately closed the survey without casting my vote because I was not in support of any of the 4 options presented. I went about my day and thought several times how frustrated I was that I wasn't given an option that I could support in the survey. Then yesterday a reminder email went out to cast your ballot on the GOP survey for the COVID-19 pandemic relief fund usage proposals. Again, I immediately clicked the link, in hopes that the survey had been modified to include other options so I could cast my vote. Obviously, that was not the case and again, I was unable to cast my vote. I decided I needed to communicate this to you in hopes there are others who also feel the same and have shared it with you as well.

I truly feel the 4 options presented in the survey are a concerningly potential misuse of funding. I am having a hard time connecting the dots on how a new courthouse, etc, has anything to do with the COVID-19 pandemic relief. The money is intended for use by the county and its constituents to aid in the hardships that resulted from the pandemic.

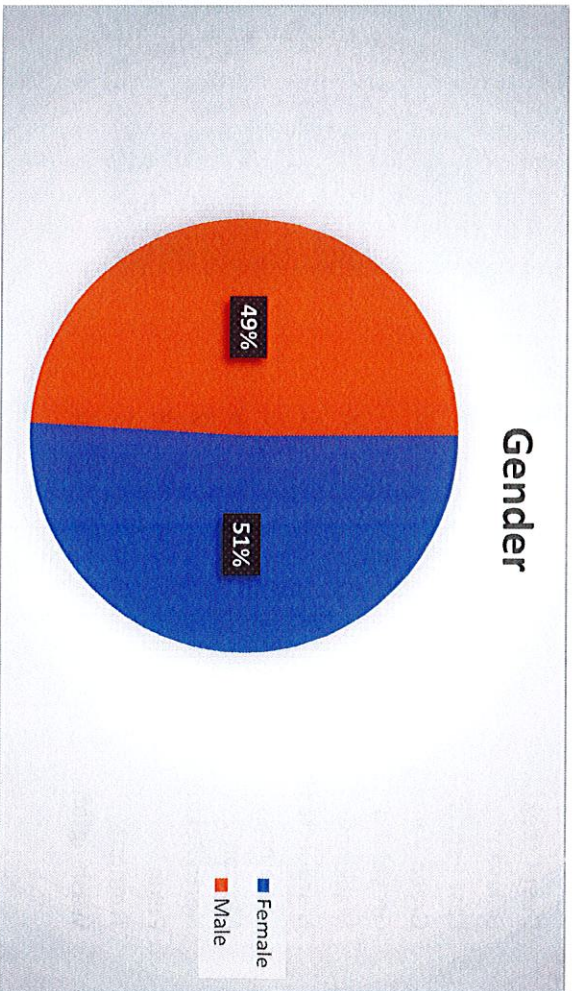
Thank you for taking the time to review my email.

**Comment 7.** After consulting with a few of our county board people, I understand the need to move some of the court services to the Justice Center. Our liability is we did not properly engineer and build that building way back when. The footing situation prevents the building from being improved upward which was a huge miscalculation and lack of foresight on someone's part. The options on the survey which propose moving the court services to another building are ludicrous. I am sure COVID \$\$\$ can be much better spent. How about working with business that were significantly impacted by the pandemic? How about investing in health care services that will better fight such a problem in the future? I did not vote for any of the options on your survey.

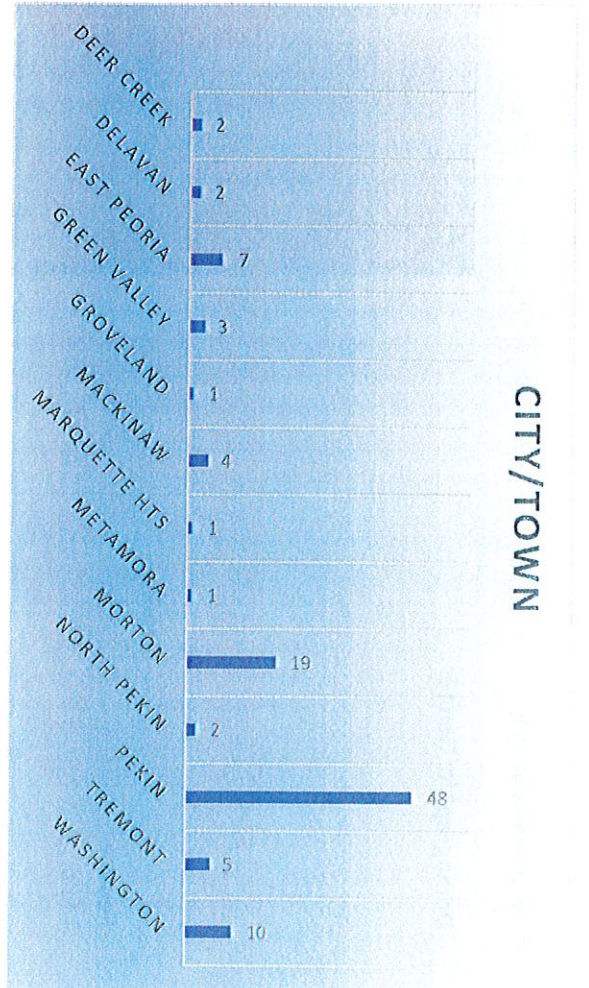

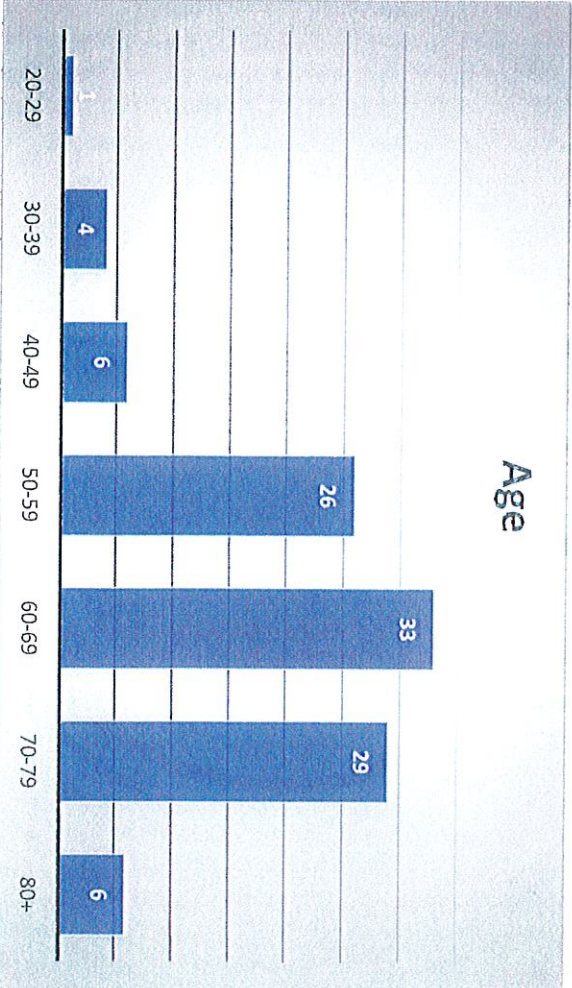
**Demographic: Location**

**Demographic: Age**

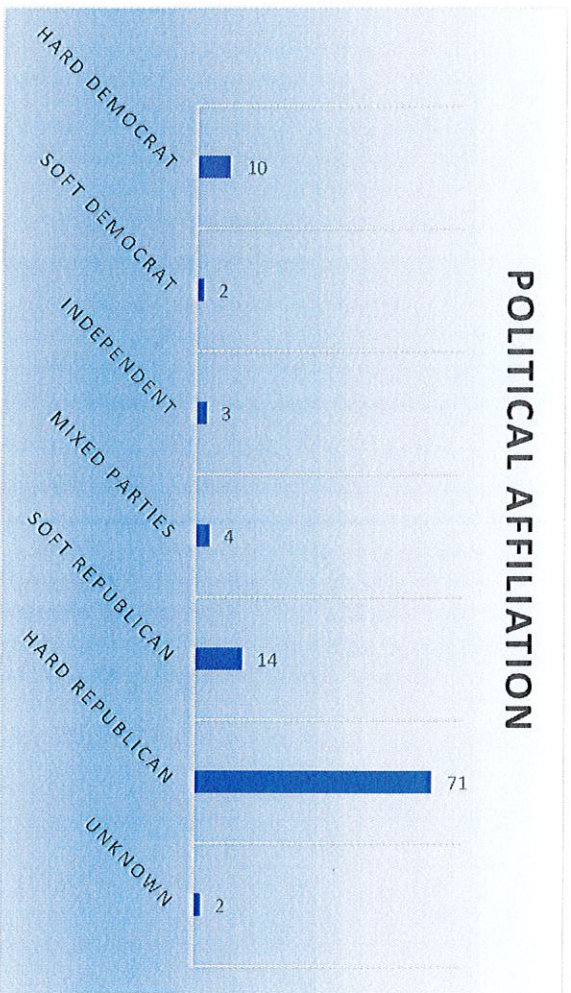
